Director's Corner

Dietrich Bonhoeffer has always been a favorite hero of the faith. If you get a chance to watch the movie, I encourage you to do so. It is a powerful message about a courageous man who took a stand against a demonic evil unleashed on the world.

Pastor Bonhoeffer was executed just three weeks before Hitler's defeat and suicide. Showing this scene at the end brought such a hush over the theatre you could hear a pin drop.

In spite of all the unfathomable circumstances Bonhoeffer faced, he penned these words: "...And then, just when everything is bearing down on us to such an extent that we can scarcely withstand it, the Christmas message comes to tell us that all our ideas are wrong, and that what we take to be evil and dark is really good and light because it comes from God. Our eyes are at fault, that is all. God is in the manger, wealth in poverty, light in darkness, succor in abandonment. No evil can befall us; whatever men may do to us, they cannot but serve the God who is secretly revealed as love and rules the world and our lives."

Not everyone and not every Christmas is filled with happiness because that depends on our circumstances. But all of us who know the Lord can be filled with joy as we look at our troubles through the biblical lens of eternity.

As many of you know, our grandson suffers from severe mental illness. We love him fiercely, and he is the most compassionate and considerate young man you would ever meet when he is mentally well. We are heartbroken over the horrific results of one of his breaks from reality. Broken, yes, but our hearts have never been closer and in tune with the sufficiency of Christ. God can use our brokenness as we lean heavily into Him.

May God in His mercy lead us through these times; but above all, may He lead us to Himself.

When everything seems well in our world, we have a tendency to become near-sighted. When the troubles of life come, they can direct us to see things from an eternal perspective.

I recently wrote and had a book published about the circumstances we are facing. It's called *Turning the Tables on Tragedy*. Romans 8:28 and Genesis 50:20 are reality!
